




The acronym GCSE stands for General Certificate in Secondary Education

The GCSE qualification aims to give you a broad, general knowledge across a range of subjects and there are some subjects that everyone studies.

These include:





But the great news is you also get to choose some of the subjects you study at GCSE.

This is important because it enables you to focus on specific areas that you may have a passion for or a particular interest in.

They are also important as they enable you to start taking the first steps towards a possible future career path.







In other words, you can think of the options process as getting in the right lane so that you can go in the direction you want.

The process of choosing subjects enables you to start a plan based on your interests and ambitions.

So, where are you heading?


A <u>PREAM</u> Written down with a date becomes a <u>GOAL</u>. A goal broken down into steps be comes a <u>PLAN</u>. A plan backed by <u>ACTION</u> becomes <u>REALITY</u>.



Right now you may not know exactly what you want to do with these options, and that's okay.

It doesn't matter which group you see yourself in because there is no right answer here.

Based on experience we know that you will fall into one of these 3 groups:

> Some of you may know where you want to go and in this example we can use a step by step approach to deciding what routes you want to take.

This sequence of signposts shows how we can use your destination (what you want to do when you leave school) and trace the steps back to help you to choose GCSE options that lead to your end goal.

# Group 2

You can use the information here to help you choose the qualifications that help to leave your options open.

You can focus your planning by considering the subjects you enjoy and are interested in.

This plan gives you a route that enable you to follow a journey, even though the destination is not yet defined.

Or you might fit into the next group...

'I have no idea what I want to do after school'.

Look at subjects that you enjoy now.

Look at subjects that you might enjoy in 2 years.

Look at what jobs these subjects can lead to.

Are these jobs that might interest you?

It's okay to leave your options open at this stage.



**Group 3** 

You might be somewhere in between group 1 and 2. You might know that you want to go to university or that you'd like to undertake an apprenticeship.

But you might not be sure what course at university you think will be best or what apprenticeship will best suite your skills

As with group 2, this plan gives you a route that enables you to follow a journey, even though the destination is not yet defined. 'I have ideas about my future but I also have some questions'.

Look at subjects that you enjoy now.

Look at subjects that you might enjoy in 2 years.

Look at subjects that can lead onto your idea.

Are there jobs that interest you which lead on from the idea you have?

It's okay to leave your options open at this stage.
